

Paris Markets (various)

(from Reddit): Go to marché d'Aligre in the 12th arrondissement, an authentic, traditional Parisian market, with a very good reputation and reasonable prices.

Yes! Aligre on a sunny day is wonderful.

Bastille Market on Thu and Sun is nice.

High end grocery stores such as Galleries Lafayette (the other side of the boulevard), La Grande Épicerie in the Bon Marché are fun as well.

Marché des Enfants Rouge and the rue de Bretagne (eat at Enfants du Marché).

Rue Mouffetard

The Marche des enfants rouges has the best sandwich place in Paris (Chez Alain Miam Miam) and various other great food shops. Be aware that it gets absolutely PACKED around lunch time

1st arrondissement

Marché "Saint-Eustache-Les Halles"

This new market perpetuates the tradition of street commerce in the Halles district.

Rue Montmartre, between rue Rambuteau and rue du Jour

From 10am to 8pm • Metro: Châtelet-Les Halles

2nd arrondissement

Marché RUE MONTORGUEIL MARKET (permanent market street)

Rue Montorgueil Look for Maison Stohrer, oldest bakery in Paris.

From 8 am to 6 pm • Metro: Metro Étienne Marcel (line 4), or Sentier (line 3)

3rd arrondissement

Red Children's Covered Market (Marché couvert des Enfants rouges)

from 8:30 am to 9:30 pm without interruption • Metro: Temple or Daughters of Calvary

5th arrondissement

Maubert Market (small market on side of street)

A few centuries later, it was moved to the periphery, to the current location of Place Maubert.

Maubert Square

From 7am to 1:30pm • Metro: Maubert-Mutualité

6th arrondissement

Covered market St-Germain (Marché couvert St-Germain)

4/6 Lobineau street.

from 8am to 8pm without interruption • Metro: Mabillon

7th arrondissement

Saxe-Breteuil Market (mostly food to cook: fish, cheese, produce, etc.)

On the avenue of Saxe.

7am to 1:30pm • Metro: Segur

10th arrondissement

Covered market St-Martin

31/33 rue du Château d'Eau.

from 9am to 8pm without interruption • Metro: Château d'Eau

Covered market St-Quentin

The largest covered market in Paris, sometimes dizzying.

85 bis, bd Magenta.

from 8am to 8pm without interruption • Metro: Gare de l'Est

11th arrondissement near Canal

***Bastille Market** pretty big, with food, artwork, kitchenware, clothes, looks like some food stalls, too.

(formerly Richard-Lenoir)

Bd Richard Lenoir between Amelot and Saint-Sabin streets.

From 7am to 1:30pm • Metro: Bastille // Bréguet – Sabin • 1 min walk

12th arrondissement

Ledru-Rollin Market

Avenue Ledru-Rollin between Lyon and Bercy streets.

From 7am to 1:30pm • Metro: Gare de Lyon, Quai de la Rapée

Golden Gate Market

Avenue Daumesnil, even side between the bd Poniatowski and the avenue Michel Bizot

Odd side of the Poniatowski bd, between No. 91 of the boulevard and Daumesnil Avenue.

From 7am to 1:30pm • Metro: Golden Gate

Marché d'Aligre

Aligre Street

From 7am to 1:30pm • Metro: Ledru-Rollin

Beauvau covered market

Place d'Aligre

The Beauvau covered market (Paris 12th) is not a Baltard hall, but it is worth a look for architecture lovers, with its inverted boat hull frame.

From 8am to 1pm and from 4pm to 7:30pm • Metro: Ledru-Rollin
